A&T to Host DoD Faculty Training Workshop

North Carolina A&T State University will host the third Department of Defense Computational Science and Engineering (CSE) and High Performance Computing (HPC) faculty training workshop for faculty from underrepresented minority serving institutions (MSI), June 16-20.

The program is sponsored by the Department of Defense High Performance Computing Modernization Office (DoD HPCMO) under its Joint Educational Opportunities for Minorities program.

Modeling and simulations, enabled by CSE and HPC, are making it possible to study and understand complex and large

scale problems in many fields that were once very difficult to solve. The purpose of the workshop is to introduce and educate the attendees to the field of computational science and engineering and high performance computing technologies (hardware, software, HPC software, simulations

and applications, communication, visualization) that form the backbone of challenging real world problems.

DoD and other government agencies heavily employ these techniques to solve several real world problems in various technical disciplines such as engineering, materials, electronic battlefield environments, system of systems, sensor image processing, chemical/biological defense, climate and weather modeling. It is imperative that future scientists and engineers – especially, minorities and women – be exposed, educated and trained in these critical technology areas.

The purpose of the workshop is not only to educate and train the MSI faculty but also to encourage them to employ these techniques in their own work, introduce the techniques to their students at all levels, and to encourage and guide their students, especially minorities and women, to pursue graduate studies and careers in these critical technology areas.

Study Underway to Assess Print Needs

A study is underway to assess the University's print requirements.

The process will include a survey and an inventory of all of the campus' reprographic equipment, including fax, copier and printing equipment.

"This initiative is part of the UNC General Administration PACE study to reduce cost and increase efficiency," said Ted A. Little, director of purchasing. "A committee is being assembled to study the University's printing needs and requirements. Once the study is completed we will develop a scope of work and prepare a Request for Proposal (RFP) to seek bids from various vendors."

Little said that several departments have received requests for presentations and seminars from various print companies.

"We are asking all departments not to jeopardize this process by allowing vendors to make presentations to your departments," Little added. "The Purchasing Department will be the main point of contact for those requests, and vendors will be contacted at the appropriate time."
